Marina del Sol received her Ph.D. from the Américo Paredes Center for Cultural Studies at The University of Texas at Austin and her B.A. from the University of California, Berkeley. As a Master Instructor in the English Department at Howard University, she teaches critical writing courses that focus on language, identity, and the public sphere. She also serves as the Director of the Writing Across the Curriculum Program for the College of Arts and Sciences at Howard University.

Dr. del Sol's research centers around citizenship, bias, and cultural representation, and she has a strong commitment to projects that examine the theoretical implications and power dynamics of digital humanities work, including issues related to bias in archives. She is particularly interested in how language, identity and power operate within techno-social systems. Her current digital humanities project, "Writing with Hurston," focuses on archival research, cultural documentation, and writing. This public-facing project centers Zora Neal Hurston's body of work and seeks to foster public engagement with digital archives.
